And the arts just keep on coming - poetry, Art to Go, classes, the Gallery Shop (featuring members' work). Read all about it inside - and stop by!



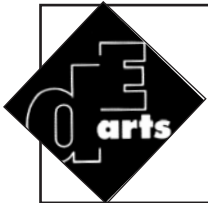

The site is available all day Monday, when the NAA is closed, and at other times depending on space needs and type of activity. We'll do our best to accommodate you. Contact Administrative Director Susan Logan at 302-266-7266 or info@newarkartsalliance.org about availability.

For most activities, the fee for each three-hour period (all or a portion) is \$50 on weekdays, \$75 on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. That fee provides use of the building (Main Gallery, Gallery Shop, classroom, kitchen, restrooms, tables and chairs), a volunteer to open and close the building, and free parking in the adjacent lot.

A \$100 deposit (in the form of a personal check) is required. It will not be cashed except to cover cleaning costs or damage to the building or contents.

Children's parties in the classroom are \$75 for up to 2.5 hours, and can include art instruction and supplies.

March 30-April 28: "People of the People's Republic"
Solo show of photographs of China by Peggy J.O. Schultz
Opening reception: Fri., March 30 • 7-9 p.m.

"A lifelong pleasure in finding patterns and shapes in serendipitous arrangements of objects and people brought me to photography," says Newark artist Peggy J.O. Schultz. "I agree with Henri Cartier-Bresson, who said that to take photographs is 'to find the structure of the world - to revel in the pure pleasure of form,' to disclose that 'in all this chaos, there is order.'"

The artist's two most recent trips to China are documented in this show. She and her husband were headquartered in Beijing and made trips to the Jiuzhaigou Valley, Nanjing, and Pingyao. "I was especially privileged to be allowed onto one of the work sites of the 2008 Olympic games. Gray hair does wonders in China," she says.

Schultz photographed most of the images horizontally "to not only preserve a sense of each person's environment, but to provide a visible space in and to which my subjects can walk. And I tried to express a sense of place without shooting pictures of great places. I think that by showing a lot of microcosm that the macrocosm takes care of itself, and maybe with more insight than would the macrocosm.

"I shall have been successful in this show if you share with me the

pleasure I found in capturing on film these lovely people and their environments, and that you will enjoy with me the self-esteem which seemed to shine in the eyes of the people of the People's Republic of China."

The photographs were taken on film with either a medium-format or 35 mm camera and developed professionally, then scanned into a computer for lightness and contrast correction, cropping, and printing.

"The Leica (35 mm) is probably the most fun to shoot with because it's a little black camera that is totally non-automatic, except for its light meter, and makes only a whisper of sound when I touch the shutter," Schultz says. "I usually use a wide-angle lens on the Leica and often appear to focus somewhere other than at the subject. Consequently, my subjects are seldom impressed with either the Leica or me and are likely to assume natural poses in cases where they have advance warning that they're to be 'shot.'"

This is Schultz's fourth solo show. She has been exhibiting for seven years.

Interested in commissions? The NAA has a membership benefit just for you. Artists can submit a two-page sample of their work to be exhibited in an artist registry portfolio binder at the NAA. Visitors interested in finding, for example, a muralist, jewelry maker, poet, or musician, can flip through the binder and connect with NAA artists. Each artist is limited to two 8.5x11-inch pages. The information must be professionally presented. Artists are encouraged to donate a commission to the NAA when they get work through the book.

NAA members: Get your work in the Gallery Shop!

The opportunity to sell work in the Gallery Shop at the Newark Arts Alliance is one of the benefits of NAA membership. All types of artwork are welcome: paintings and prints, ceramics, jewelry and other "wearable art," music and poetry – and much more.

Artwork can be dropped off during regular NAA hours. The Gallery Shop Committee juries submissions during the fourth week of each month. Accepted work is displayed for one to three months.

The jury criteria are: originality (no kits or copies); well-crafted, skillful execution; and professional presentation. All 2-D work must be framed with picture wire for hanging, or mounted, matted, and covered with acetate. Unframed flat art should not exceed 24 inches in any dimension.


All work must be for sale. The commission to the NAA is 30% for non-working members and 20% for working members (at least four hours per month).

NAA Exhibition Gallery Guidelines

For juried shows, artists may submit up to three pieces. The submission fee is \$5 per artwork. This charge supports promotional and other costs associated with the exhibit. If the fee prohibits you from participating, please write to the Exhibition Gallery Committee and request a waiver.

Please include label on each entry with your name, the title of the work, the medium (acrylic, raku, computer scan, etc.), your phone number and e-mail address, and a selling price, if applicable. (Work may be marked NFS.) All 2-D work must have a hanging wire on the back and must be framed in keeping with professional standards (no dirty mats, damaged glass, chipped frames, etc.).

Commission on sales to the NAA is 20% for working members (at least four volunteer hours per month), 30% for non-working members, and 40% for non-members.
