Toe shoes, trumpets, trombones, and tubas!

When you spend your evening at the Four Seasons Gala on Sat., Nov. 4, you'll see special performances by two of the three arts organizations that make up the sponsoring group, Mosaic.



Mid-Atlantic Ballet performs a piece that highlights the winter season. The Snow Queen, two soloists, and a small corps de ballet will perform "The Land of Snow," an excerpt from *The Nutcracker*.

Mid-Atlantic Ballet was founded in 1997 by Artistic Director Sara Taylor and is dedicated to providing quality ballet training dance education, and performances.

Members of the **Newark Symphony Orchestra** brass section will fill the Trabant University Center with horns – trumpets, trombones, and tubas – to play several short Late Renaissance pieces composed by Giovanni Gabrieli. The music will answer back and forth as Maestro Roman Pawlowski conducts from the center with a brass choir on either side.

Pawlowski has been music director of the symphony since 1983. The orchestra's members come from Delaware, Pennsylvania, and Maryland. A small group of NSO musicians will also provide music during the event.



The **Newark Arts Alliance**, the third organization in the Mosaic group, sponsors the live and silent art auctions.

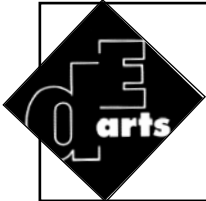

Poets compete deep in the heart of Texas

So it was August, and in Delaware we were in the middle of the worst heat wave of the season. What did the 2006 Delaware National Poetry Slam Team decide to do? Why, we went to Texas because, as everyone likes to ask, it was indeed NOT hot enough for us.

This year the National Poetry Slam was held in Austin, Texas, from August 9-12. Three- to five-person teams from 73 cities were there to compete for the coveted title of 2006 National Poetry Slam Grand



Champions. The event requires the team to compete in two preliminary bouts against four other teams, one on Wednesday and one on Thursday. Based on the standings after the second night, the top 25 teams are taken into semi-final bouts, culled down to five, and pitted against each other in the finals.

On beyond number placement

The Word Dancing team from Delaware – J.P. Pelletier, Matt McDonald, and Hannah Renk, with coach Beverly Wilkinson – accomplished much more than a simple number placement this year. Word Dancing poets were momentarily labeled as "weird." This is an accomplishment because, as you can imagine, out of the hundreds of poets who show up to this competition each year, being labeled "weird" meant we were bringing some originality to the stage. Since Word Dancing holds itself to higher artistic standards than most venues, being recognized for heartfelt, humorous, and original work was a victory in itself.

Poets on a team who perform solo pieces both nights are ranked on a list of individual placement. This year there were 88 poets who performed solo pieces on both nights. When the dust had settled, Matt McDonald placed 21st and J.P. Pelletier placed 59th. The team as a whole ranked 64th, which is an eight-spot increase from last year's placement. Once again it was a tremendous learning experience and an excellent opportunity to make connections to bring some outstanding talent back to the Newark Arts Alliance for features and to enrich our artistic community.

What's next?

The Word Dancing group meets Tuesdays at 8 p.m. at the NAA. There is a \$3 cover, and the sessions are suggested for ages 15 and up due to occasional subject matter and language. Upcoming events include featured poet Andrea Gibson on Oct. 10. Gibson, from Denver, CO, is an IWSPS third-place winner.

Annual meeting set for Oct. 4. The Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors, which is open to all NAA members and the public, will be held Wed., Oct. 4, at 7 p.m. at the NAA. The agenda items include approving the Board members and reviewing financial and program reports.

NAA members: Get your work in the Gallery Shop!

The opportunity to show and sell work in the Gallery Shop at the Newark Arts Alliance is one of the benefits of NAA membership.

All types of artwork are welcome: paintings, pottery, cards and postcards, jewelry, sculpture – and much more. The committee is particularly interested in expanding the collection of music, literature (novels, poetry, chapbooks, cartoon anthologies, etc.), and films for sale in the shop.

Items can be dropped off at any time during regular hours.

Submissions are juried by the Gallery Shop Committee during the fourth week of each month. Accepted work will be displayed for one to three months.

The jury criteria are: originality (no kits or copies); well-crafted, skillful execution; and professional presentation. All 2-D work must be framed with picture wire for hanging, or mounted, matted, and covered with acetate.

All work must be for sale. The commission to the NAA is 30% for non-working members and 20% for working members (at least four hours per month).

NAA Exhibition Gallery Guidelines

For juried shows, artists may submit up to three pieces. The submission fee is \$5 per artwork. This charge supports promotional and other costs associated with the exhibit. If the fee prohibits you from participating, please write to the Exhibition Gallery Committee and request a waiver.

Please include label on each entry with your name, the title of the work, the medium (acrylic, raku, computer scan, etc.), your phone number and e-mail address, and a selling price, if applicable. (Work may be marked NFS.) All 2-D work must have a hanging wire on the back and must be framed in keeping with professional standards (no dirty mats, damaged glass, chipped frames, etc.).

Commission on sales to the NAA is 20% for working members (at least four volunteer hours per month), 30% for non-working members, and 40% for non-members.
