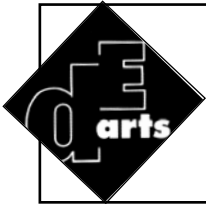

More artwork for the Gallery Shop, please! Jewelry, cards, and unframed are particularly popular. Do you know artists whose work would sell well? Encourage them to join the NAA and submit their work for the shop. See the box below for details on commission and work rotation. The policy is also on the NAA Web site.

Interested in commissions? The NAA has a new membership benefit just for you. Artists can submit a two-page sample of their work to be exhibited in an artist registry portfolio binder at the NAA. Visitors interested in finding, for example, a muralist, jewelry maker, poet, or musician, can flip through the binder and connect with NAA artists. Each artist is limited to two 8.5x11-inch pages. The information must be professionally presented. Artists are encouraged to donate a commission to the NAA if they get work through the book.

Artful birthday parties at the NAA. You can celebrate a youngster's special day with an art-oriented party at the Newark Arts Alliance. You get exclusive use of the classroom for 2.5 hours (\$75), an art instructor for a one-hour project (\$40), and art supplies (\$3 per child). Choose from a variety of projects. NAA members: Get your work in the Gallery Shop!

The opportunity to show and sell work in the Gallery Shop at the Newark Arts Alliance is one of the benefits of NAA membership.

All types of artwork are welcome: paintings, pottery, cards and postcards, jewelry, sculpture – and much more. The committee is particularly interested in expanding the collection of music, literature (novels, poetry, chapbooks, cartoon anthologies, etc.), and films for sale in the shop.

Items can be dropped off at any time during regular hours. Submissions are juried by the Gallery Shop Committee during the fourth week of each month. Accepted work will be displayed for one to three months.

The jury criteria are: originality (no kits or copies); well-crafted, skillful execution; and professional presentation. All 2-D work must be framed with picture wire for hanging, or mounted, matted, and covered with acetate.

All work must be for sale. The commission to the NAA is 30% for non-working members and 20% for working members (at least four hours per month).

NAA Exhibition Gallery Guidelines

For juried shows, artists may submit up to three pieces. The submission fee is \$5 per artwork. This charge supports promotional and other costs associated with the exhibit. If the fee prohibits you from participating, please write to the Main Gallery Committee and request a waiver.

Please include label on each entry with your name, the title of the work, the medium (acrylic, raku, computer scan, etc.), your phone number and e-mail address, and a selling price, if applicable. (Work may be marked NFS.)

Commission on sales to the NAA is 20% for working members (at least four volunteer hours per month), 30% for non-working members, and 40% for non-members.

All 2-D work must have a hanging wire on the back and must be framed in keeping with professional standards (no dirty mats, damaged glass, chipped frames, etc.).

Set aside the evening of Sat., Nov. 4, and make your reservations for the Four Seasons Gala, the first event sponsored by Mosaic, the “collaboration of Newark arts” that combines the efforts of the Newark Arts Alliance, the Newark Symphony Orchestra, and Mid-Atlantic Ballet.

Just call the NAA at 302-266-7266, request an invitation at www.newarkartsalliance/mosaic.html, or mail a check to the NAA, 100 Elkton Road, Newark, DE 19711. You'll receive a confirmation and your name will be on a list at the door that night.

The fundraiser will be held from 7-10 p.m. at the University of Delaware's Trabant Center on Main Street, where the ballroom will be decorated to carry out the “four seasons” theme.

Live and silent art auctions, music and dance performances, an array of gourmet finger foods from local restaurants and the University, and a complimentary cocktail are all included in the ticket price. A cash bar also will be available.

Newark Mayor Vance Funk and Terri Kelly, CEO and President of W.L. Gore & Associates, are the honorary co-chairs for the gala. Newark City Councilman Paul Pomeroy will wield the auctioneer's gavel as items created by area artists – from paintings and jewelry to ceramics and wearable art – go up for bid.

Restaurants providing refreshments include the Blue Crab Grill, Brewed Awakenings, Caffé Gelato, Cucina di Napoli, Home Grown Café, and Matilda's Australian Restaurant. The major sponsors are Paul Schlosser, Vance A. Funk III, Wilmington Trust, W.L. Gore & Associates, Landmark Engineering, Verizon, ZZ House Design and Print Studio, and *The Newark Post*.

Tickets are \$75 per person or \$65 for two or more. Proceeds will be divided among the three nonprofit organizations to maintain a vibrant cultural community and provide quality arts programming in Newark.

Annual meeting set for Oct. 4. The Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors, which is open to all NAA members and the public, will be held Wed., Oct. 4, at 7 p.m. at the NAA. The agenda items include approving the Board members and reviewing financial and program reports.

New hours. The Board has approved a reduction of about an hour a day in the times the NAA is open for business. The new hours are Tues.-Fri., noon-7 p.m., and Sat. and Sun., noon-4 p.m.

Energy audit. A professional energy audit of the NAA building was conducted in mid-August to determine whether there are additional ways we can save on utilities.

Mural money. The mural project for the Casho Mill overpass, an effort to reduce graffiti, has received \$1,000 in support from the Produce Marketing Association.

Interns join NAA staff. Two interns from the University of Delaware will lend their talents to the NAA this fall. Each will contribute a four-hour shift at the NAA and work with committees and on their own.

Julia Young will focus on the Exhibition and Gallery Shop committees. She will assist with the show proposal process, exhibit preparation and openings, inventory control, attracting and promoting artists, and marketing the shop.

Artful space for rent!

Looking for an artful, convenient, cozy spot for your business meeting, wedding or baby shower, anniversary dinner, performance, small-hall concert, children's birthday party, or other event? Check out the Newark Arts Alliance at 100 Elkton Road.

The site is available all day Monday, when the NAA is closed, and at other times depending on space needs and type of activity. We'll do our best to accommodate you. Contact Administrative Director Susan Logan at 302-266-7266 or www.newarkartsalliance.org about availability.

For most activities, the fee for each three-hour period (all or a portion) is \$50 on weekdays, \$75 on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. That fee provides use of the building (Main Gallery, Gallery Shop, classroom, kitchen, restrooms, tables and chairs), a volunteer to open and close the building, and free parking in the adjacent lot.

A \$100 deposit (in the form of a personal check) is required. It will not be cashed except to cover cleaning costs or damage to the building or contents.

Children's parties in the classroom are \$75 for up to 2.5 hours, and can include art instruction and supplies.

**"All Fired Up," a solo show of ceramics by Carole Fox

Carole Fox could probably come up with a dozen "artsy" reasons for choosing pottery – but that's not her style. So, why?

"Because it's fun! I just love it; it has endless possibilities and there's endless creativity. It's so direct – you have your hands right in it," she explains. "Of all the creative things I tried, working with clay was the most fun."

Her first experience with clay was as a Brownie at summer camp. "They had a program where we dug clay out of the side of the creek, cleaned it, made pottery, made glazes. It was the most awesome thing to me."



The Elkton, MD, artist opened Silver Fox Pottery about 10 years ago. In addition to creating her own "functional pottery," she teaches. This summer, she was one of the instructors in the NAA's "Art to Go" program.

Fox's ceramics show up frequently in NAA exhibits and in the Gallery Shop, but this is her first solo outing. "I took this as a chance to have some more fun – try things that I've never tried before and expand on what I've been doing."

She hasn't abandoned her vases, bowls, mugs, and plates. Or her wheel. Or her raku, horsehair, and mid-fire porcelain techniques. Or her penchant for swirls, curved pieces, and narrow-footed designs (they're more elegant).

She's added coil work, used as a design element rather than a structural one, and whimsical little sculptures including an elf girl and a mermaid. She's also working on masks. "I learned a lot while I was experimenting," she says. "I get new ideas while I'm working on something; each piece is a springboard for a new idea."

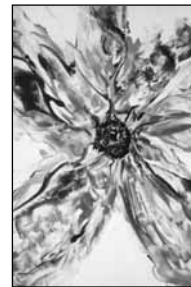
